Prof. Naomi Fulop, University College London and Chair of UK Health Service Research Network

Naomi Fulop is Professor of Health Care Organisation & Management in the Department for Applied Health Research, University College London and Visiting Professor at King's College London. Prior to her move to UCL in April 2012, Naomi was Professor of Health Policy at King's College London. Naomi led the recently completed major research programme on quality and safety in European Union hospitals, and currently leads the NIHR funded study of major system reconfigurations of stroke services implemented in London and Greater Manchester, and planned in the Midlands and East of England. She is a co-investigator on the newly established NIHR CLAHRC North Thames. Naomi is the elected Chair of the Health Services Research Network, a UK-wide network bringing together those who produce and use health services research to improve policy and practice.

Prof. Bernadette Hannigan, Director of Research & Development, Public Health England

Bernie took up her current role in August 2014; Public Health England itself was established in 2013 with responsibility for protecting the health of the population and promoting health and wellbeing. From 2008 until 2014 Bernie was Director of R&D for Health and Social Care in Northern Ireland and Chief Scientific Advisor to the Department of Health, Social Services & Public Safety. Previously she was at the University of Ulster in a range of posts including Pro-Vice Chancellor (Research & Innovation) and she is now an Honorary Professor.

Prof. Steve Thomas, Trinity College, Dublin

Steve is an Associate Professor in Health Policy and Management and a co-Director of the HRB-funded national SPHERE Programme in Population and Health and Health Services Research. Currently, he is leading research into: (1) The viability of Universal Health Insurance in the Irish context; (2) The resilience of the Irish health system in the current economic crisis and compared to other countries in crisis (Portugal, Greece and Spain); (3) Human resources motivation and international migration (4) Workforce planning for the universalisation of care.




POSTER PRIZE

Sarah-Jo Sinnott, a scholar on the HRB Scholars Programme in University College Cork, recently won a poster prize at the International Conference of Pharmacoepidemiology in Taipei. The poster presented research on the impact of two prescription charges on the General Medical Services scheme in Ireland on patients' adherence to medicines.

The research found reductions in adherence to medicines, although the reductions in adherence to less-essential medicines were larger than those observed for essential medicines. The major exception to this trend was for anti-depressant medicines where large decreases in adherence were found.

Scholar Snapshots

Year One Experiences

nitially, the experience of starting the SPHeRE programme was both exciting and slightly daunting. During our first week we attended a peer learning day where we met fellow scholars and got an in depth look at what SPHeRE is aiming to achieve; we were becoming part of a growing national network of high-quality population health and health services researchers with the aim of impacting the future quality and relevance of health research in Ireland. Although this was an immense opportunity which I was going to embrace, I knew that day that I had a lot to learn.

The taught modules provided a good grounding in all aspects of population health and health services research. Throughout the first year my knowledge on the workings and organisation of health systems, and the various factors that impact on population health began to expand. Estimating the cost of HIV care in Ireland By Aline Brennan, UCC

The emergence of highly active antiretroviral therapy (HAART) for human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) infection in the mid-1990s altered the status of HIV from an acute to a chronic disease. Consequently, the overall need for in-patient and palliative care has decreased and most HIV care is now provided in an out-patient setting except for age-related morbidity and late presentation of previously unknown diagnosis.

In Ireland the HIV service is centralised, with six centres of excellence providing care for approximately 3,000 adults. Demands on this service are going to increase in coming years due to changes in the epidemiology of HIV and its clinical management. Given the current finan-

cial climate in Ireland, it is reasonable to assume that additional demands on the HIV care service will have to be managed within currently available resources.

My research aims to describe current service delivery patterns and estimate the current cost of providing ambulatory HIV care in Ireland, in order to evaluate the financial impact of potential changes. The information generated by this research will provide policy and decision makers with the relevant information needed to plan and implement the most effective use of available resources.

Understanding the Irish private health insurance market By Conor Keegan, TCD

Inderstanding the effectiveness of competition within health insurance markets can be understood, to a large extent, through analysing consumer mobility. That is, the decision to switch health insurer should be based primarily on price and quality considerations while large inequalities in mobility should not exist for certain groups (e.g. older, sicker). Moreover, in community-rated markets insurers may face incentives to 'cherry-pick' younger and healthier enrolees, which can have a distorting effect on competition.

My PhD research hopes to understand the drivers of consumer mobility in the Irish private

health insurance market, as they relate to both the consumer and the motivations faced by insurers. In terms of the latter, this includes analysis of the efficacy of Ireland's recently introduced risk-equalisation scheme which attempts to reduce incentives for 'cherry-picking' through reimbursing insurers for the risk they hold. Such research is of particular importance given current plans to expand the role of health insurance in financing Irish healthcare.


Alumni Focus

was one of the inaugural group of PhD Scholars who joined the Programme in 2007. As a clinical dentist I had very little formal research training and I benefitted immensely from undertaking modules in areas such as statistics, research methodology and health policy. As part of the Programme I got to know friends and colleagues from University College Cork, Trinity College Dublin and the Royal College of Surgeons. I had the opportunity to spend time at the University of Nijmegen in the Netherlands and attend a number of national and international conferences.

My PhD research focused on provision of care for older patients and has now been published in a large number of high impact dental journals. During the Scholars Programme I developed a particular interest in health economics and Professor Charles Normand from Trinity College Dublin acted as an external supervisor for my PhD alongside Professor Finbarr Allen and Dr. Denis O'Mahony from University College Cork. As a direct result of this collaboration I included a cost-effectiveness analysis in my research which added substantial credibility to the project outcomes.

After the HRB Scholars programme I was appointed as a Lecturer in Prosthodontics and



Oral Rehabilitation in University College Cork. Recently I have been appointed as Senior Lecturer and Consultant in Restorative Dentistry in Queens University Belfast and will take up my new post in November 2014. My other roles now also include contributing as a member of the National Oral Health Policy Advisory Group and as President of the European College of Gerodontology 2014-2015.

health. I am now using the skills I gained managing research projects, coordinating data collection and analysing large data sets to understand how we can improve the chances of a long and healthy life for women with breast cancer.

As a postdoctoral researcher with the Breast-Predict Collaborative Cancer Research Centre, I am working with the Breast-Predict team and our partners in hospitals across the country to establish retrospective and prospective breast cancer cohorts. We are collecting biological samples and information on general health, quality of life, medication usage, and lifestyle from women diagnosed with breast cancer across Ireland with linked information on tumour characteristics and cancer related outcomes from the National Cancer Registry. This infrastructure can be used to build collaboration for population health and health services research in the area of breast cancer.

The structured Scholars Programme equipped me with a broad foundation of knowledge, a range of transferrable skills and a fluency in the language of population health and health services research that have proven invaluable in my current role. The Programme enabled me to develop my competence and confidence conducting rigorous and robust research. The cohort of scholars who shared ideas and supported each other throughout the PhD process, are now a group of colleagues sharing expertise, contacts, and leads on jobs or funding opportunities. I am very grateful for the opportunities open to me as an alumni of the programme and feel privileged to be part of the growing SPHeRE network of highly committed population health and health services research-

The National Consultative Forum

he SPHeRE Programme's inaugural National Consultative Forum (NCF) meeting took place on Friday September 5th. The NCF's composition is by invitation and is composed of academics from the 8 Higher Education Institutions (HEIs), policy, practice and advocacy groups as well as representation from the HRB. The Forum has three primary functions:

- 1. To advise on national population health and health services research (PHHSR) priorities;
- 2. To support the Programme in building a national network of researchers, policy makers and practitioners in PHHSR;
- 3. To advise on the development of a stronger knowledge translation role within the SPHeRE programme, bridging the gap between policy/practice and research/academia.

The discussions at the autumn meeting focussed on development of a list of key PHHSR research priorities for the coming 5 years, with members in attendance agreeing to draw up a list of research priorities and topics of interest that are of direct concern to their organisations, through a process of collaboration with their colleagues. This list will be collated by the SPHeRE team and ultimately will inform the direction of PHHS doctoral research conducted via the HRB funded SPHeRE Programme.
