ABOUT THE SPHERE PROGRAMME

he SPHeRE (Structured Population and Health-services Research Education) Programme is an innovative and ambitious research programme in population health and health services research (PHHSR) funded by the Health Research Board (HRB).

It encompasses the expansion of a wellestablished and successful structured PhD Programme in Health Services Research, alongside key objectives to establish a national network in PHHSR, expanding to include all higher education institutions (HEIs) in Ireland beyond the three founding institutions (the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland (RCSI), University College Cork (UCC) and Trinity College Dublin (TCD)), and developing a programme of online modular education accessible to all. The new programme will provide education and training for five cohorts of PhD scholars annually (2013-2017). The SPHeRE Programme will develop a national training facility that (i) encompasses all universities in the Republic of Ireland; (ii) provides a meeting place for future cohorts of researchers; (iii) is accessible to those outside the PhD training system; (iv) focuses on research that is relevant to population health and health services challenges in Ireland; and (v) aims to facilitate the translation and implementation of the research produced by its students. In order to enhance the process of research translation the SPHeRE Network has been established. The Network will provide opportunities to share research priorities and findings across sectors.

Research Snapshots

Scholars on the SPHeRE Programme are engaged in a wide variety of Population Health and Health Service Research. The following is a snapshot of research currently being conducted.

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Supporting suicide and self-harm reduction strategies through effective research By Irene O'Farrell

D eliberate self-harm is a major public health problem both nationally and globally which results in an estimated 9,000 persons presenting to hospital emergency departments each year in Ireland. In 2002, the direct cost associated with hospital treated self-harm amounted to approximately €20.3 million. However, current costs will be considerably more as the rate of hospital treated self-harm has been increasing in both men and women since 2006.

International research has identified selfharm as being the one of the strongest risk factor for suicide. However, the risk of suicide after self-harm is not well established as relatively few countries have accurate data on self-harm. Given that Ireland is the only country in the world that has a national registry for the population monitoring of hospital treated deliberate self-harm, my research will be the first to establish the risk of suicide and death from external causes after an episode of hospital treated self-harm at a national level. Moreover, much research to date has focused on examining the association between area-level factors (such as deprivation or social fragmentation) and suicide, while relatively few studies have examined this association in relation to selfharm.

The main objectives of my PhD research are to examine the association between hospital treated self-harm incidence and area level risk factors and to establish the risk of suicide and deaths from other external causes in hospital treated self-harm patients. Reducing suicide and selfharm is an explicit goal of the Irish national strategy on suicide prevention 'Reach Out'; and to do this evidence from appropriate research is needed to inform preventative strategies. The estimation of the risk of suicide after an episode of selfharm needs to be accurate if we are to plan services aimed at reducing the rate of suicide. It is hoped the findings from my



research will enhance our insight into the predictors of suicidal behaviour and therefore help inform preventative strategies.

Undertaking the PhD allowed me to build on my academic background and focus on developing my analytical skills to the high standard required for progressing a career in health policy and research.
